The Institute for Public Architecture welcomes applications from emerging and mid-career urbanists, architects, policymakers, artists, and those committed to the public realm in all disciplines, to apply for a 14-week residency in The Block House on Governor's Island, Manhattan Harbor in New York City.

About the residency

This opportunity represents a major expansion of IPA's signature two-month Summer Fellowship, which has gathered early and mid-career practitioners and academics from the fields of social and environmental equity, climate change adaptation, and community-based alternatives to speculative real estate development. In contrast to the Summer Fellowship, which focuses on issues specific to New York City, this new opportunity allows Fellows to bring their own interests and projects to New York City, with its vast network of expertise and leadership in the fields of architecture, design and urbanism.

Fellows receive opportunities to present their work to the public on Governors Island and in a variety of public and professional forums in New York City. Each Fellow also receives invaluable project support through introductions and access to individuals and resources relevant to their project.

Costs

Typically, residencies are self-funded or supported by applicant's institutions, but the IPA offers several opportunities for discounted housing in exchange for modest contributions to upkeep at the Block House. The program fee is \$4800 for housing with kitchen access and workspaces. Personal discretionary expenses include food and local transportation of approximately \$200 a week.

About the IPA

We use design to challenge social and physical inequities in our cities. We address urgent issues of design and policy by mobilizing our network of design activists, professionals, government officials and community stakeholders. About the Block House

The Block House is a landmarked, stone-trimmed Greek Revival building designed in the 1840s by architect Martin E. Thompson. The building derives its dignity from its well-disciplined scale. During the decades during which Governor's Island was a U.S. Naval Base, the Block House served as a General's headquarters, Officers' quarters, a hospital and a Prison. The Block House contributes to the vibrant, culturally diverse and verdant Nolan Park and today stands as one of the oldest structures on the Island.
